A Word from the General Manager

Greetings, friends of WPSU!

As I take a moment to reflect on WPSU's journey through 2024, I am proud to share the meaningful work the station has accomplished over the past year. My gratitude goes to our supporters, collaborators, and community who make this impactful work possible.

For the past 59 years, WPSU has been sparking discovery, enriching learning, and strengthening community in central and northern Pennsylvania — and globally, thanks to our streamed and digital programming.

Some of our signature programs remained viewer favorites in 2024.

Our Town continues to capture the spirit of local communities from the perspective of the residents and community volunteers. *Our Town: Big Valley* won a Mid-Atlantic Regional Emmy Award. And season 4 of *Keystone Stories* explored more of the interesting people, places, and things that make Central PA unique. WPSU's always-popular *Weather World* began streaming on demand to audiences, making the weather magazine program accessible to a larger audience.

Our commitment to education is stronger than ever. Thanks to a grant from the Imagination Learning Foundation, we launched the Learning Grief website to help kids and teens navigate the big feelings that come with loss. Also new in 2024 is the WPSU Education Ambassadors



program, a cohort-based engagement opportunity for Pennsylvania educators. And as in years past, WPSU provided tens of thousands of children with digital educational programming on PBS LearningMedia.

We are a trusted and accessible source for local news, covering the important topics that directly impact the people living in central and northern Pennsylvania. In 2024, our news team was recognized for excellence in journalism with seven prestigious awards, including the Edward R. Murrow Award from the Radio Television Digital News Association.

As we face a 20% cut in Penn State funding, we are taking this challenge as an opportunity to become even more responsive to the needs of our community. As part of our preparations, we are doubling down on understanding the content that the WPSU community values most so we can prioritize this programming and continue to produce it under our reduced budget model.

While reflecting on WPSU's remarkable achievements in 2024,

I'm both inspired by what we've accomplished and mindful of the challenges ahead. The impact showcased in this report demonstrates the vital role we play in our community — a role that can only continue with your steadfast support.

Television Programming



WPSU produces, airs, and streams a robust variety of television programming tailored to the interests of our regional viewers. Our programming covers the arts, local history, sports, and more. Truly, there is WPSU programming to capture the imagination of almost any viewer!

A Landmark Year for *Our Town*

One of our highlights for 2024 was being honored with a Mid-Atlantic Regional Emmy Award for *Our Town: Big Valley*, one of the most recent installments from season 25 of our popular *Our Town* series. In this award-winning, movie-length video, volunteers from the Kishacoquillas (or “Big”) Valley came together to share stories of Native Americans, the Amish, the Belleville Civic Club, the Reedsville revitalization, and more.

For more than 40 years, *Weather World* has been a trusted source for expert weather coverage in the Central Pennsylvania region. Airing every evening on WPSU-TV, this daily weather magazine is a partnership between WPSU and Penn State’s Department of Meteorology. Our team of expert meteorologists delivers in-depth statewide forecasts while exploring how weather shapes our daily lives through engaging segments. In 2024, *Weather World* continued its legacy of bringing reliable and insightful weather reporting to Pennsylvania. Beginning in October 2024, *Weather World* reached 24,496 viewers through streaming channels including YouTube TV, Hulu, the PBS app, and WPSU’s website.





The Local Groove Presents

This spin-off of our popular radio show features musical performances by Pennsylvania artists at WPSU’s studio. Seasons three and four included Ted McCloskey and the Hi-Fi’s, Caledonia, The Jaded Lips, Jon Smith’s Voyages, Ma’aM, Marshmallow Overcoat, The PennSoulvanians, and Natascha & the Spy Boys.



Culinary Connections

This series tells the stories of people and places in our area that use food to connect with the world around them. These restaurateurs and artisans create more than culinary experiences, they create connections to their patrons, communities, and cultures. *Culinary Connections* episodes tell an engaging story paired with a cooking demonstration with guest chefs from local restaurants such as Horn O Plenty in Bedford, Pine Grove Hall in Pine Grove Mills, Mama Randazzo's in Altoona, and The Cakeshop by Tati in Pleasant Gap.



Keystone Stories

This broadcast and digital series takes viewers to the breathtaking, interesting, sometimes quirky, and hidden gems around the central Pennsylvania region. Pennsylvania’s beautiful landscape serves as the backdrop for an exploration of the people, places, and culture that make the region unique. WPSU produced and aired four new episodes in 2024 – "Secondhand Treasures," "Farming," "Taking Flight," and "Sweets."



The Chance to Wrestle

Girls are stepping onto the mat in record numbers, making wrestling the fastest-growing high school sport in the country. This WPSU original documentary follows athletes from around Pennsylvania as they vie for coveted state titles in the inaugural season of girls’ high school wrestling. The film reflects on Pennsylvania’s deep wrestling roots and highlights the passion, dedication, and determination of female wrestlers finding their footing in a historically male-dominated sport.

As Stephen's popularity surged in 2024, our video, "Stephen Nedoroscik: World Champion Gymnast," saw **49,000+ new streams on YouTube and the PBS app.**



Year-Round Gardening

▶ 17 NEW EPISODES IN 2024

Featuring Penn State Extension educators and master gardeners, *Year-Round Gardening* gives bite-sized gardening tips for Pennsylvania and beyond. In 2024, episodes focused on mulch alternatives, tree pruning, pest management, and much more. Episodes air as interstitials on WPSU-TV and have been **streamed 34,100+ times** on YouTube, the PBS app, and PBS LearningMedia combined.



Past PA

▶ THREE NEW EPISODES IN 2024

Past PA is a video series that helps audiences develop a deeper understanding of important Pennsylvania people and events that

they have likely heard about, but might not know the deeper stories of. New episodes in 2024 explored the near meltdown at Three Mile Island, the life and legacy of Milton Hershey, and the struggle for the abolition of slavery in Pennsylvania. Episodes air as interstitials on WPSU-TV and have been **streamed 7,000+ times** on YouTube, the PBS app, and PBS LearningMedia combined.



A Season at Shaver's Creek

▶ FOUR NEW EPISODES IN 2024

A Season at Shaver's Creek features footage of black bears, rare birds, porcupines, and more — captured on trail cameras, with commentary from Wildlife Program Coordinator Alex Suleski. Viewers get to explore the glory of natural Pennsylvania at four distinctly different times of the year. Episodes air as interstitials on WPSU-TV and have been **streamed 3,000+ times** on YouTube, the PBS app, and PBS LearningMedia combined.



World Kitchen

▶ 12 NEW EPISODES IN 2024

In *World Kitchen*, viewers are invited to learn to make dishes from around the world while hearing from guest chefs about the cultures, history, and traditions surrounding each dish. This free interactive cooking class is presented on Zoom so that viewers can follow along to create the recipe with each guest chef.

In Their Own Words

▶ SEVEN NEW PODCAST EPISODES IN 2024

In Their Own Words invites listeners to embark on a captivating exploration of African American musical legends. This exclusive podcast prioritizes their untold stories in the music industry, offering a rare glimpse into their musical evolution, the influence of church music, encounters with influential figures, and transformative educational experiences.

Science-U @home

▶ FIVE NEW EPISODES IN 2024

Science-U @home is a collaborative production from WPSU and Penn State Science Outreach in the Eberly College of Science. These videos provide fun activities for grown-ups and kids to explore science together. *Science-U @Home* videos emphasize asking questions and seeing what happens. All the science is explained in a “How it Works” section to encourage exploration and reinforce learning.

Episodes air as interstitials between WPSU’s PBS Kids programming and have been **streamed more than 102,700 times** on YouTube, the PBS app, and PBS LearningMedia combined.



Education Services

Working with our PBS partners across the state, we continued to serve Penn State’s land-grant mission by aligning educational resources with PBS programming to supplement student learning at home, while supporting teachers and caregivers with resources for the classroom.



WPSU Education Ambassadors

In 2024, we launched the inaugural 27-member cohort of WPSU Education Ambassadors. This program is an exciting opportunity for educators from across the region to join their peers in professional development, networking, and ongoing support from PBS and NPR public media stations.

To kick off the initiative, WPSU Education provided a full-day training focused on deepening educators’ understanding and integration of media literacy. WPSU then provided support throughout the year through virtual trainings and continual resource sharing and opportunities.

Community Engagement Spotlight

Cozy Corners

This year, WPSU collaborated with community partners to create four new Cozy Corner spaces, providing welcoming and playful engagement spaces for waiting areas in service centers, medical facilities, and community organizations. Children may feel anxious or overwhelmed during challenging family situations, such as medical emergencies or other stressful events. Cozy Corner spaces provide a comforting and engaging environment where children can feel safe and supported. With activities, reading nooks, and learning materials, these spaces offer a welcoming retreat to help children navigate difficult moments with a sense of ease and security.





Ready To Learn

A collaboration of WPSU, the U.S. Department of Education, PBS KIDS, and the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, this initiative connects children’s media and learning environments to help build key skills for success in school and life, including functional literacy, critical thinking, and collaboration. It also explores career options in age-appropriate ways. WPSU collaborated with the Moshannon Valley YMCA, CenClear, and Central Intermediate Unit 10 to create a Philipsburg-based Learning Neighborhood that fosters a community-wide culture of learning at home, in the neighborhood, and within local systems and spaces.



PBS LearningMedia

WPSU and PBS continued to work in collaboration, creating and curating free, curriculum-aligned videos, interactive lesson plans, and more for teachers.



There were **146,455 total views** for PBS LearningMedia in 2024.

Your Vote Matters!

A digital initiative created in partnership with PSU Votes and Government Relations to support the democratic election process in Pennsylvania and beyond.

Carmen's Eco-Farm Adventure

An interactive game that allows students to learn how a farm can be environmentally friendly, profitable, and sustainable in a future with climate change.

Healing the Red Mo

A video series that shows how central Pennsylvania citizens, nonprofits, public officials, researchers, and students are taking action to clean the Moshannon Creek and bring it back to life.

Learning Grief

A free online resource created to equip caregivers with the skills to help kids and teens navigate the big feelings that come with loss. Learning Grief was developed in collaboration with nationally recognized experts and leaders in trauma, grief, loss, and child and adolescent psychology.

Pennsylvania Pathways

A documentary video series through which students learn firsthand about education and training, apprenticeships, skills, job satisfaction, and what it takes to succeed in a variety of careers, such as architect, restaurant chef, IT instructor, and solar array installer.

Financial Literacy

A three-part video series designed to teach young adults the basics of how to create a budget, borrow money, and avoid financial scams.



WPSU Virtual Field Trips

Students can participate in interactive tours of a variety of interesting local locations without ever leaving their classrooms. Each virtual trip includes rich multimedia content, PDF teacher guides, and the option to request teacher kits. Virtual field trip locations include:

Shaver's Creek Environmental Center

Shaver’s Creek Environmental Center is Penn State’s nature center. Students can learn about animals, the environment, and conservation.

Elk Country

With a focus on conservation education, the Elk Country Visitor Center is the perfect place for students to learn about Pennsylvania wildlife.

Fort Roberdeau

Students can virtually visit a historic military fort located just outside Altoona, Pennsylvania, and explore the daily jobs and responsibilities of those who lived in and around the fort.

WPSU Studios

Students can explore television and radio production studios and see how PBS shows make it to television and other devices at home!

Centre County Recycling and Refuse Authority

Students can learn where trash and recycling go after the garbage truck picks it up from their homes.

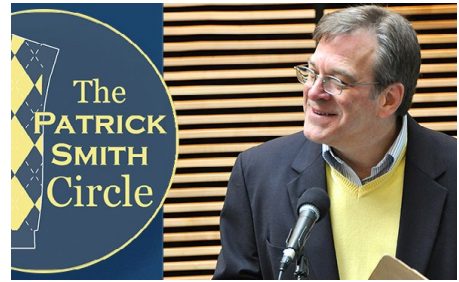
