Welcome

- Greg Petersen called the meeting to order, welcomed the board members and reviewed the agenda.
 - Approval of May meeting minutes
 - A motion was made (Sara) and seconded (Gary) to approve the May 20, 2020 meeting notes as presented.
 - The motion passed unanimously.
 - The Executive Committee has invited Dr. Steven Carpenter, Dean of the College of Arts and Architecture to join the WPSU Board beginning in November 2020. Dr. Carpenter has verbally accepted this offer. Once the formal invitation from Dr. Barron has been extended and accepted, the process will be formalized. We do have several additional open board positions so please continue to put forward suggested new board members to us.
- GM Remarks – Thank you for joining us today.
 - Good News

- In June, WPSU radio reporter, Anne Danahy won second place for a Public Media Journalists Association award for use of sound for her frog song filled “[Nightlight in Central Pa. Vernal Pools](#)”
- WPSU was nominated for [six Mid-Atlantic Chapter Emmy Awards](#) with virtual ceremonies being held September 19.
- PA PBS
 - [This website](#) is a recent collaboration of all seven PBS public media stations putting an identify together to showcase the great education and production work across the commonwealth. The main audience is legislators and their staff and the key objective is to increase state funding.
- Strategic Planning
 - We held a special all staff meeting in June to review our current strategic plan and get ideas and suggestions for extending this plan through 2025.
 - This plan will ensure we align with both Outreach and the University’s plans.
 - Examples of the proposed changes were reviewed with the goal of completing this plan for your review before our next meeting in November.
- COVID-19 Impact
 - Working from Home
 - The majority of staff have been asked to work from home for the foreseeable future.
 - Working in the Office
 - Essential employee safety protocols have been established. We have implemented them and will enforce them.
 - Financially
 - With the recent transition of Penn State’s financial system from IBIS to SIMBA, we do not have any current year end fiscal data to report today. We will have a year-end report for FY 19-20 at the next meeting as well as a proposed budget to share with the board.
 - We did finish the year better than anticipated (thanks to the Cares Act) however we still finished with a deficit.
 - Staffing
 - Knowing we have had deficits for a few years now and not knowing the pandemic will impact this upcoming year we did have to make a few difficult decisions to lower our costs especially in our largest staffing expense category, salaries and fringe benefits.
 - Looking to the Fall
 - We are working to sure up some revenue streams and to create some new ones. We have had some requests from University clients for virtual events and productions and we have recently been meeting with athletics our largest university client to discuss our sports production work. We are making every effort to partner with our PSU clients to continue our robust production services this fall.
 - Potential additional revenue sources
 - PA Dept of Education –
 - Continue Learning at Home initiative
 - Potential Educational Channel

- Potential Data Casting – for those who lack high speed internet connectivity
 - PAPBS has submitted a proposed scope of work and are waiting to hear back about what will be approved for funding this year.
 - HEALS Act -
 - Watching how negotiations are going for the latest COVID relief bill to see how public media will be impacted.
 - We do feel confident that there may be some funding similar to that of the CARES Act where the station benefited from funds allocated to public media efforts.
 - Grants applied for (project specific)
 - Front Line grant – what it's like to be a reporter of color in rural central PA.
 - Additional Science-U work
 - Speaking Grief -
 - Geospatial Revolution
 - Mental Health Project
 - Close to having a new tenant on our Clearfield tower
 - We hope to reduce electric and maintenance costs by implementing and replacing our transmitter this fall using Dr. Keiko Miwa Ross' generous donation received about two years ago.
- Generally speaking, we are taking a number of actions to scale back our costs and to increase our revenue stream to ensure our financial security during this pandemic and well beyond.
- A Production Highlight
 - June 29 virtual roundtable with black university leadership exploring race and climate that we produced and the conversation included active participation from viewers through a chat room monitored by WPSU Producer and Director, Will Price.
 - Two more similar roundtables are scheduled for this fall.
 - We are taking the local and national discussion focused on race very seriously and exploring via community conversations and media coverage.
 - Cheraine is working on a plan to ensure this continues for the short and long term.
 - Speaking Grief release and virtual events were also highlighted.

- VP of Outreach, Tracey Huston Remarks
 - Thank you, board members, for your support and service. You inspire us in good times and in tough times and it means a lot.
 - Thank you, Isabel who has remained unflappable and positive in these demanding and ever-changing times.
 - Thank you to Isabel's leaders, staff, producers, and technical service team who work hard to provide service to our listeners and viewers during this difficult time.
 - They have been creative in finding ways to deliver community engagement while remaining socially distant.
 - They have been serving PreK-12th grade learners in over 100 school districts across Pennsylvania.
 - They have served this university by:
 - ✓ coming up with a way to hold virtual commencement exercises that were viewed around the world
 - ✓ Town Hall meetings on some of the most difficult things that have been facing this university's history
 - ✓ Town Hall meetings that provide new opportunities and hope for our community such as Speaking Grief. Tracey told Dr. Barron that WPSU hopes to be experimenting with this very innovative, synchronous, social media platform live stream distribution followed by a panel discussion in real time.
 - ❖ We had so many comments stating THANK YOU for bringing this documentary to the world.
 - ❖ This project was extraordinary because it gives us another tool in our tool kit.
 - These projects are possible due to all of WPSU being creative and flexible.
 - Thank you to you, our board, who support us in all that we do.
 - Tracey introduced Deyo Olorunnisola an Administrative Fellow who will shadow Tracey for the year in most university engagements to learn and grow. Deyo is the Director of the Schreyer Honors College Admission Office here at the university.

Staff Reports

- Development - Rob Buter outlined the impact that the pandemic has had on fundraising. There is a lot of reason for optimism with regard to fundraising efforts.
 - Because of the leadership from both Jessica Peters on the membership side and also from Don Bedell on the Business Support and underwriting side there is a lot of positive evolution in our fundraising the last couple of years.

- University leadership asked that all units across the university NOT do any mailings around membership renewals, additional gifts or lapsed memberships. We are going to start again this week.
- We missed our spring radio drive but in June following the TV drive we did have our radio “halftime drive” that was successful but again, it was half the goal so we did not raise as much as we normally would with a full drive.
- From the start of the pandemic to the end of the fiscal year, we calculate we lost about \$31,000 in business support commitments either thru cancellations or delayed contracts. Even at the start of this new fiscal year we have some businesses delaying support due to the unknow impact of the pandemic on their ability to support the station.
- We are impacted in our ability to raise funds for events since they too have been mostly cancelled (International Children’s Festival for example) due to the pandemic.
- All that being said there is reason for optimism:
 - For TV, in FY19-20 we raised 99% of our commitments goal for membership. I cannot recall the last time we were that close to making our goals so kudos to Jessica and Michele Chernega for that remarkable work.
 - At the start of this fiscal year we have 4,460 TV members, that is an increase of 720 members over last year at this time. Of those 19% are monthly sustaining contributors.
 - On the radio side, last fiscal year we raised 84% of our goal due to missing half of a radio drive as well as the loss of mailings. We do have over 2,250 radio members which is an increase of over 92 members over last year at this time. 31% of those are sustaining monthly members. That is very exciting.
 - Part of the reason we have an increase in our sustaining memberships is due, in part, to matching challenge donations which netted 73 new sustaining members and an additional 19 members actually increased their membership amounts during this challenge.
 - The idea of a monthly sustaining member challenge grant came from Sara Songer. Thank you to both Sara and Tom Songer who provided funds for one of these generous and impactful challenge grants.
 - The funds provided by the Songers lasted only two days of the drive so it would be wonderful to have more matching grants of this nature to last the entire drive.
 - We know these incentives help, having premium gifts, etc. does help but challenge grants really do help and there is no cost to the station.
 - On the business support side in FY19-20, TV, FM and events sponsorship raised 81% of the overall goal. There are many challenges remain to our local businesses. We are still continuing to have conversations knowing it will get better.
 - There are several five figure commitments to WPSU which has been a rarity in the past, so this is a testament to Don’s efforts and leadership.

 - Centre Care
 - Boalsburg Car Company

- Everett Cash Mutual Insurance – our single largest business supporter of WPSU.
 - So far, this fiscal year, our business support team has secured over \$105,000 in commitments. Of that, \$11,100 was raised for the Our Town Hollidaysburg production which exceeded our goals.
 - On the planned giving side, last year TV had over \$360,000 in bequest commitments (or realized bequests) and FM had over \$380,000.
 - We learned that a local resident, Marjorie Seward, established an endowment at Centre Foundation which generates quarterly payment which annually will total about \$7,800. That same donor subsequently passed away and we learned that she had put WPSU FM in her will. Her estate gift of over \$133,000 was received just last week.
 - We are promoting these bequests as well as planned giving and we are starting to see results from that.
 - We expanded our team with a third Business Support Rep, Lori Smeigh, who has a background in sales and fundraising, major gift fundraising and public media underwriting experience with WITF. We are very excited to have her on the team.
 - We have changed a lot of how fundraising is done at WPSU in the last few years and we are confident in the direction we are heading. Our mantra is Relentless Optimism and we have a lot of reason to be optimistic.

Board Sharing from your community

How has COVID-19 affected your community and share anything you may know about where and how media and technology have been used to mitigate its impact?

John Lacny – has been closely monitoring how the pandemic has affected ridership of ATA transportation. Maintaining ridership for essential services and funding have been great challenges. They are seeing some good things as a result of this pandemic in the form of future leaders (food banks, emergency procedures, etc.). John is very proud to be a part of public media. Democracy Works is a great program and discussing how COVID-19 has affected the election, issues of race issues, and also other extraordinary interviews. John hopes the relationship with The McCortney Institute continues.

Sara Songer – concerned with return of students but is seeing more masks so that is encouraging. Schools will likely start and then shut down. She doesn't see an end point, will likely continue at least through the winter. I see the challenge of introducing things and keeping things going with all that is happening. Seeing parents working from home but kids are in their separate rooms, parents should be involved with the learning. This is a critical missing part of educating at home. Do we want to address this? How do you make learning a family affair? Educate the parent in how to teach?

Kate Bennett Truitt – lives in a mostly over 55 community with a mother at Foxdale. Seeing a lot of isolation, people are not going out. Through various conversations (while walking the dog), a major concern is when students get back. Technology has made it easier for elderly to be active but we are in a marathon and maybe a quarter of the way to “back to normal”. Personally, every day when I turn my radio on and hear NPR it makes me feel really good. It’s always there for me. I appreciate the extra effort it has taken to keep things moving smoothly.

Greg Petersen – there's been a lot of work from home for news staff, for music staff, the front-line people have to disinfect everything. Staff has kept it as operational as possible and have done a tremendous job. Is there a plan for the Conn Dinner? Isabel noted the event will be cancelled due to the closing of the NLI and the Penn Stater having no availability on the given date. We are exploring our options for postponing, alternate options and so on.

Jennifer Judd – Omni Bedford Springs – we are busy! We have highest occupancy rate of any property in the system excluding their Florida resort. We have over 300 per day, including kids. It’s neat because people are taking advantage of the non-urban setting to get away in the country. Guests are generally considerate but somewhat frustrated. It’s good to see that we do have people spending money in our region to have these experiences.

Jennifer Neely – everything about my world is education and technology has everything to do with that now. We are offering in person, on campus classes as well as on line. We changed times classes start so that the majority of the time zones around the world can participate. Jennifer’s daughters Montessori school is offering a virtual option as well. In-laws are retired but involved in the church online to stay connected. We have been researching and collaborating to get a new LMS Learning Management System in place which was new to us since that is not the traditional boarding school way.

Amy Frank – have sewn 6,000-7,000 masks for the SCASD. The Makery has benefitted greatly with virtual shift but the downtown area is really suffering. How much do we want to encourage gathering there? We are still trying to figure it out. I am so impressed as a person who works with families and am excited about what the WPSU Education Committee discussed today. We need to find ways to tell the story of what all we are doing. We did small summer camps virtually from the Makery while it was closed.

Vince Mannino – was just in Bedford Springs for a mini-honeymoon and had a wonderful time there. Recently moved from Mifflin County to Bellefonte. COVID-19 affected Mifflin County drastically with over half a dozen businesses that have permanently closed. We need to be aware of the next aspect of this COVID-19 story. How businesses and communities recover from these losses. There was help available however the banks and the local people couldn’t maneuver through the processes to get the money. Shared the government relations letter with the Lewistown Sentinel.

Ilona Ballreich – technology is wonderful while doing outreach work for Penn State in the Sustainability field. We have been branching out to commonwealth campuses. No field trips but technology helps! Huntingdon has suffered greatly, Juniata College is struggling with layoffs, planning in person classes, they rely heavily on foreign student enrollment so COVID has really affected this. The arts organization in Huntingdon had to vacate their building because they couldn’t have events. I rely on WPSU TV to bring back some normalcy and sanity each evening. I have been renovating a house which has given me a reason to “get out” and

avoid isolation which is good. We are planning a wedding for her daughter next month which went from the princess wedding to one with just 16 guests. Has a son living in off campus housing in State College that she worries about with COVID-19 exposure.

Kelly Hasting – a lot of people wearing masks and also a lot NOT doing so. 68% of parents want their kids back in the classroom so that is what they are planning on. Technology is great but with a rural community, we have broadband issues. Her community closes Main Street on Friday so town can gather and visit (at a distance). First Quality (paper goods) is hiring so there are job opportunities here! Glad to be a part of WPSU serving on this board and also an on-air volunteer. Many of whom are coming in and taking over for some of those who are not in a position to report to the station. Kelly is an on-air volunteer at WPSU.

Sherry DelGrosso - now camping in the mountains taking advantage of family time and Michael's travel ban. Echo what everyone else has been said. The family business has had to make lots of changes, 3 family weddings have been affected. Our community is innovative where people are coming together (YMCA, school districts, etc.). Families are becoming closer. Cyber charter schools have seen 450% increase in enrollment inquiries with 1,100 new students. There are transitions from brick and mortar schools to virtual.

Matilda Illuzzi – We need to look at the true medical aspect in a small rural area – fear factor that media portrays with skewed numbers. Dr. Illuzzi (Matilda's husband) – for example knows of a case of a DuBois area health care worker who tested positive– you have to test double negative – 3 days apart in a row before being able to come back – she had 10 additional tests – of those, 8 were positive, 2 negatives, (all while being quarantined). There is an argument to be made that the number of deaths (with Covid19 present, but not necessarily the cause of death due to other life-threatening issues) are still being counted as Covid19 deaths to allow for more funding to funnel to the more rural US hospitals. Matilda's point? “We can't be fearful - We need to be cautious, but we also need to live with this – and take everything we are hearing with a “grain of salt”.

Her best advice is to talk with local leaders, local health care officials and local folks to find the best comfort level.

CONN DINNER IDEA - Let's brainstorm! – Have 1 or 2 people who were at the table call everyone else at their table and with a few bullet points highlighting what we have been - largest fundraiser - provide talking points of the ways WSPU has helped our communities (Learning at Home, Covid19 stories, Race issues, etc). “Go back to the Old-fashioned way with a true thank you and a lovely hand-written note!” Ask folks to contribute \$100 or more to help this special year.

John Pozza – we have suffered in Jefferson County, the Opera House Café closed. Restaurants have had a very difficult time with the space limitations due to COVID, etc. On the positive side, as a result of COVID, a lot more people are going outside, going to parks and trails. We have the Redbank Valley Trail very close by with trailhead in Brookville. People are buying bicycles and now they are selling out. On a personal note, a large family wedding has been postponed and will have to limit the number attending so that was disappointing. I am only able to FaceTime with my mother in California who is in a facility there. Schools have been proactive providing Chromebooks to all students. Being patient and respectful is my advice.

Kevin Mead – staying at his isolated lake home in Erie. I don't really go out except to Wegmans once a week. I am in WQLN territory here which leaves a lot to be desired!
People seem to be wearing masks and keeping to small groups.

Rhonda Seaton - As a parent of two college kids, one at Penn State, I've been very impressed with how both the university and local communities are working diligently to prep students for a safe return to campus, also understanding that the only permanent thing we can count on is living with uncertainty and being ready to adapt. There are so many unknowns, but people are working very hard behind the scenes to make the transition successful for all concerned. Media and tech figure very prominently in providing students, parents, faculty, staff and community members with important information as events and news evolve.

Also wanted to share that there is a scientific reason why we are all feeling so strung out at the end of a day of Zoom calls. It has to do with neurons and social cues our brains automatically look for in physical interactions; when we are not together physically, our brains are constantly trying to read physical cues that are impossible to process, so this overtime work, makes us very tired, even if we are unaware. There is a great article to share on WSJ about this attached and below.

- Top 10 prospects - Rob

Theme: Brainstorming

- Best fundraising practices during a pandemic
 - Question from Rob: Have you had any non-profits who have reached out to you—how are they reaching out? Are their methods effective or ineffective?
 - Jen: Two organizations that she is involved with had to cancel galas, moved to online auctions. One was very successful the other is still going on (an auction that is open for 10 days, has had participation so far).
 - Typical event has a silent auction, live auction, and “fund the need” as part of gala – still doing all 3 of these online (Pennmont Academy)
 - Rhonda: Relationship building with donors – Jana Marie Foundation gave them early in the pandemic a grab bag/ “goodie bag” left at their doorstep. “Was like getting a bag of sunshine. Completely unexpected.”
 - Impressed with how quickly they did it.
 - Amy: Behind the scenes, JMF strategically gave those bags to specific community members and was hopeful that those people would post on social media about the bags and spread awareness about JMF
 - Amy: Involved with Centre County Youth Service Bureau: all 3 big events were canceled, facing a \$300K shortfall.

- Converted the hashtag themes from in-person events #OnTheField, #OnTheFly and #OnTheGreen to #StillOnTheField #StillOnTheFly #StillOnTheGreen asking people to take pictures of themselves at home doing these activities and to also make a donation.
 - Brought in about \$150K and increased social media presence
 - Virtual events can be hard and a lot of work, but this was a relatively easy project and solution
- Amy: Also involved with Bob Perks Foundation. They are doing a straight GoFundMe campaign. People understand there's a need that non-profits have, so there can be a direct ask and people will respond
- Jen: Non-profit cat rescue in her town, has been having a yard sale each weekend
- Tim: Theatre company in Bradford did an outdoor event in the parking lot of the theatre, had singers and other performers on stage (mask was on microphone as well), sold t-shirts for the theatre, had a 50/50 raffle, asked for donations
 - Was a successful evening
- Tim: Involved in 2 other organizations that do auctions—one has canceled, the other is doing an event in September with a live and Zoom component.
- Tim: Builders group that he's part of canceled a golf outing and other fundraisers. Board members wondered if they should still be asking—Tim's position on that if you don't ask, you don't get
- John: The crisis has brought new people out who haven't been part of initiatives in the community before, which has been encouraging to watch.
- Rhonda: This is also an opportunity to thank our donors, and find new ways to do that. Also to reach out to donors and ask "what can we do for you" so they remember us
- Amy: Received a thank you call from Bob Perks Foundation, ended up making a gift because the gesture was gracious and genuine.
- Rhonda: Friend who is a fundraiser for a summer camp, made big batch of muffins that they're known for and shipped out to campers.

Notes from Education Subcommittee (D. Herr)

Grab & Go Bags:

- Distributed the Grab & Go bags through summer lunch programs at Centre County YMCA Anti-Hunger Program, State College Area SD, Altoona SD and Tyrone SD
- Filled 3600 bags with educational material and school supplies
- Funding from Department of Education grant for Grab & Go bags
- Department of Education wanted us to work with IU's 8, 9, 10, & 11, and the children served by those intermediate units

Virtual Summer Camp -

- 8 week, 30 minutes per day from M-F
- Themed weeks with Music Monday, Tuesday Tales, Wednesday Walks, Thursday STEM, and Friday Upcycle Fun; hosted by WPSU staff, authors and local librarian
- Debuted through Facebook Premier; also available on our website to view later

Movies at the Park:

- Partnered with Centre Parks & Recreation to show PBS movies
- Parks & Rec provided chalk circles for families 6-8 feet apart for social distancing
- Will continue this program as outdoor spaces are allowable space during these COVID-19 times
- Will see how things change when the students return, and maybe continue the movies in the fall

Proposed Changes for Fall/Education Activities & Events:

- Focusing on daytime schedule, what else can we do?
- Need to provide programs aligned to needs in the classroom.
- Should we do a speaker series? Maybe professional development tutorial on basic video techniques for teachers?
- Possibly do tutorials at the schools which could take place on Act 180 days for teachers. Could send out information to school districts through Intermediate Units. Possibly provide thumb drives for students
- Kiwanis does a Christmas program with crafts, hot chocolate, cookies, Santa, and prizes for kids. May consider a drive-thru program this year

- Most IUs also have a curriculum council, good group to access to let them know what programs we have available
- Are programming schedules included in the grab & go bags? Yes. Sketch books, journals, pencil, sharpeners, books, colored pencils, a card with where you can find our programming.
- Provided programming schedules to YMCA's, they copied and put in lunch bags this summer
- Raspberry pi technology will be used as a model for other areas for kids without broadband access.
- What other services can we provide, as a station, to educators and parents? Speaker series, webinars? We have talent and connections through our station
- Possible professors at PSU as speakers to provide content and support
- Children share with other children, love hearing from each other. Especially at home without peers, reaching out to other kids directly with their experiences.
- Possibly get professors as speakers from College of Education? Issues of need to meet criteria for education credits.

Community Outreach – Laura Miller

- Laura discussed how busy events and marketing has been keeping the crew.
- Mentoring and shadowing would have to be all virtual.
- Thoughts on previous ideas, Share new revised goals on ideas
- Laura reviewed three main goals: Foster sustainable connections, expand grow new audience segments, collaborate to build a state-wide presence
- Span and grow new audience. Figured out audience priorities based on research, then segmented messages appropriately, link communications sections, then use a tracking system.
- Foster sustainable connections:
 - Plan to create engagement strategy – who can consult with us, segmenting the service area to make more manageable
 - Haven't moved on the Bedford front at all. Jen had a long phone conversation with Don about that Why didn't Bedford work? Laura: No in person events until 2021 and time constraint with working on education part and speaking grief initiative
 - Sara: Not that they didn't want to participate but need to find another medium to get it to them.
 - Jen: Tried the drive-in movies, but WPSU can't charge. Kelley is spearheading this project and it is a big deal and good way to deliver content. 5 school districts in county, maybe this is where to start to make sure reaching the rural education audience. Bedford decided to go half on, half off this school year
 - Laura: Chestnut Ridge couldn't be reached for the distribution of backpacks and flyers.
- Expand grow new audience segments:
 - Kevin: need to be careful this isn't spread as their own agenda. Want to support with having their own private agenda. Laura: finding how the community wants us to engage through impute
- Collaborate to build a state-wide presence:
 - Ilona: Center for Economic and Community Development, who would you reach out to? Laura: perhaps we can have them help us test this. Can reach out to others like United Way. Ilona feels that we should look at Ag and Community Extension more proactively.
 - Ilona: how do you envision and what are you looking to from the university side for research? How do you share with the community?

- Laura: delivering through platform: OBVI. Worked with arts and architecture to do sustainable planting for less run-off. Faculty with common interest so it fits into their work. For the students there are 4 pillars that are part of the student engagement to figure out how it fits in for them.
- Iliona: her program is learning that there are some opportunities to work with communities. Williamsport, Blair county, Canoe Creek, lower bike trail, etc. rolling out a lot of energy through initiatives. Can we coordinate with them so there is a connection through mass? She will be working with those communities.
- Laura: role needs to be more than going and filming something. Perhaps sponsoring an event like a ribbon cutting.
- Iliona: VA Hospital, can we share grief counseling?
- Sara: the role is going to be coordinating the little things. The role of the Univ. needs to be a coordinator. Feels that the \$5 movie ticket price shouldn't be a roadblock. The Univ. need to step up and figure out how do we just not say we can't do that, but what can we provide that?
- Ilona: if there is a theme popping up then as a committee should think collectively how to use resources on how to help them. There is a huge water effort right now in infancy. How do we find out what the needs are in the communities?
- Sara: how do we get information out to people that have lousy connections? Sherry: How can we get education out to those with the obstacle of no cell service and internet connection? How do you reach individuals like that? Laura: that's why we switched the Learning at Home to the afternoon because if you have an antenna, you can get a connection.
